
Parents' Group Iune 5

Nursery Coordinator Needed

The position of Nursery Coordinator was created to provide consistent, quality care to children in our nursery during worship. Dear Congregational Church of Amherst,

As I sit down to write this pastor's message, I am reeling from the news out of Uvalde, TX. On May 24, 2022, nineteen children and two faculty members were murdered in their school, and the world will never be the same. My heart cries out a prayer of deep lament for their loss, and for their families.

We here in New Hampshire will never know what we have lost when we lost the lives of these small

people—which of them would have been artists or doctors or teachers or homemakers, how each of them would have shown the face of God to the world. However, we do know that the impact of this grief, pain and shock will stay with us. It will ripple out across our country, whether we are conscious of it or not. Parents will have a lingering sense of anxiety when their kids leave the house. People will worry just a bit more about what might happen when they go to the grocery store, or the movies, or to church. Folks will look at their neighbor with a little more suspicion, be a bit warier of new comers and difference. The kind of large-scale evil that we saw on May 24th—the kind of evil that shoots down school children in their classrooms— begets small-scale malice and fear that corrodes our very souls.

Yes, the world will never be the same after the shooting at Robb Elementary School. Or maybe I should say, I hope the world will never be the same. In a country that has had 212 mass shootings in the first 154 days of 2022, thoughts and prayers without action are just not enough. It is my prayer that we will not go through another cycle of outrage and amnesia as we incorporate the ongoing reality of mass shootings in this country into our consciousness. It is my prayer that our elected officials will set aside love of power and focus their efforts on creating a safer nation for all of us. It is my prayer that we will listen well to the words of Christ: "not everyone who says to me, 'Lord, Lord,' will enter the kingdom of heaven, but only the one who does the will of my Father in heaven" (Matt 7:21), and seek to bring more systemic, reliable security and peace to our communities.

By the time you are reading this, it will have been at least a week since this shooting, and who knows what the news will be cycling through by then. But I don't think this issue is going away any time soon. So, my question for you this month is this: what do you need, dear church, to process, grieve, and hold space for hope in the wake of this terrible event, and events like it? Do you think a conversation with a pastor would help? Would you like to talk, pray, and sing together as a community? Would it be helpful to learn more about this country's history of violence, so we can understand how we got to this present moment? Whatever comes to mind, please do not hesitate to reach out. My door is always open.

What do the President and Treasurer of the Woman's Association and the Resource Ministry Coordinator have in common? The obvious answer is they share the last name of Topliffe, but that is just the beginning of the story. Adrienne and Doug Topliffe are both dedicated church members who share their talents and their time in so many different ways. Often behind the scenes, they offer support and direction to others to make the things happen that help the church run smoothly and successfully.

Adrienne has been president of the Woman's Association (WA) since 2004. Her association with the WA began as a family affair; her mother, Gwen Berry, was treasurer for many years before Adrienne took over that position. For 16 years she has done double duty as president and treasurer. The WA



raises funds for the church and outreach organizations, but equally important is its role as a fellowship opportunity for women of the church and the community to come together, work together, and share fellowship together. Adrienne credits the talented, creative, and energetic women in the group for making the Good Stuff sales and the Holiday Fairs so successful. The WA also caters funeral and memorial service receptions. She modestly says she is the "administrator" who keeps everything running smoothly. She is much more than that; she has guided the 150+ year-old group through the last 18 years by reaching out to new members, helping the WA to adapt to changing times, and keeping it a vital and vibrant part of the church family.

Doug has worn several hats as a member of the church. First a member of the stewardship team and then a deacon, he enjoyed meeting new and "seasoned" members, which led to becoming the Resource Ministry Coordinator 6 years ago. But it's his role as co-chair of the Capital Campaign that has called on his skills as an engineer, leader, and cheerleader that has kept him busy for the last four years. Doug says it has been so rewarding to see the enthusiasm and the dedication of so many folks who have supported the campaign projects. He expressed pride in all of the successful projects completed, especially all of the parsonage work and the new kitchen. And he adds, we did it all with NO debt!

In their spare time, they enjoy their two sons, daughter-in-law, and a three year old granddaughter. Doug's hobbies include golf and restoring antique cars, while Adrienne enjoys gardening and solving crossword puzzles.

Both Adrienne and Doug feel that they receive a lot more than they give to the church community. If that's true, they have certainly received a lot from the Congregational Church. We are indeed lucky to have them!
