One Sunday morning, a little boy was sitting in church listening to the pastor's sermon go on and on, when he turned to his mother and said: "If we give her the money now, do you think she'll let us go?"


Nobody likes to talk about money. Apart from investment bankers, business owners, and tax preparers (and they're getting paid to do it). Nobody likes to talk about money in church. No matter how we euphemize it, reframe it, or wrap it up in a spiritual bow. No matter how many verses of scripture we quote about generosity. No matter how often we point out that the Bible mentions money, wealth, or possessions a multitude of times (over 2300 times if you're counting), or how many of Jesus' parables focus on money (11 out of 39). No matter how carefully we emphasize that God calls us to be generous with our time, talent AND treasure. As soon as the topic of money, stewardship, or "giving" comes up in church, many of us tune out, turn off, or push back. Especially if we have an uncomfortable relationship with the topic in any setting.

One comment that nearly every church hears in congregational surveys is: "This church talks about money too often." And these folks are not wrong. Because every church does talk about money, a lot. Whether it's the weekly offering, the quarterly fundraisers, the annual Stewardship Drive, or a once-every-twenty-years Capital Campaign, it can feel like all we ever talk about in church is money. The need to give. How much we give. Who does and doesn't give. How much more

we could do as a church if people gave more. How much we'll have to cut or eliminate if giving doesn't improve.

Perhaps so many of us are weary and leery of talking about money in church because so many of us are having (or avoiding) the same conversations at home. If we're concerned about rising heating costs, growing grocery bills, or balancing our own budgets at home, the last thing we want to do is come to church on Sunday morning and listen to folks talk about rising heating costs, growing electric bills, or the current budget deficit the church is facing. Especially if we're coming to church to leave those concerns and anxieties behind, or to find a bit of respite from a world that asks so much of us already.

The challenge is this: being a church in the world costs money. The building, the programs, the staff, the outreach and mission all come with dollar signs attached. Especially in churches like ours - where we are "congregational" with a small "c" as well as a capital "C". Meaning we don't have a ruling body above us that funnels money into our coffers (or bank accounts, to use a more modern term). We are an autonomous entity within a denomination of autonomous entities. The money we give flows up - to the Conference and National bodies - who in turn give out to those in need on our behalf and offer support to our individual churches in a myriad of ways. But in terms of money, there's very little flowing down. And that's the way we like it. Being "congregational" means no one has power over us because they hold the purse strings. But this also means our entire church budget is funded by the people in our pews, and the few organizations that rent space in our building.

This is why we pass the offering plate during worship, come up with fun ways to fundraise, and ask people to consider committing to a yearly pledge, so we'll know how much money we'll have in the coming year to continue to do all that we do as a church. Asking for money, like talking about money, is never fun or easy. As much as we want to talk about the heating bills and the rising health care costs for staff, this is not what compels people to give. People will give to improve a beloved historic building (as we saw with our recent, very successful Capital Campaign) but we all have heating bills at home, and there's nothing soul-giving about them. We pay them obediently and reluctantly, not with hope and joy in our hearts. What does compel us to give is purpose. And our congregation does give, generously, when a connection is made between our purpose and our giving. When donations are needed for SHARE or our Home Starter program. When supplies are needed for our Vacation Bible School. When Andrea needs new equipment for the office. When we take a leap of faith and hire a Church School Coordinator or call an Associate Pastor, knowing that deficits are very real but also surmountable, because we trust that God is a partner on this journey and we are not walking it alone.

So, from March through May we'll be hearing all about church budgets and bills and deficits, as we move through our annual Stewardship Campaign. You'll also hear people talking passionately about what this church means to them. The connections that got them through their grief. The music that fills their cup as they care for aging parents. The youth program that kept their teen alive. The opportunities to serve that opened their eyes to a greater need. When we listen to others talk about why being a part of this church is meaningful for them, we can't help but think about what we find meaningful as well. And on March 19th, Faith Promise Sunday, we'll be asked to commit whatever we can afford to give to support all that we do as this Community of Christ.

Like the little girl who thought about what she might receive in return for her generosity (escape from an overly wordy pastor!), we too can't help but think about what we receive in return when we give. Yet, we give to this church not just so we'll have a building in which to worship, opportunities to serve, and a place to go when we think no one else will take us in. We give to this church, we give to God, to ensure that others may find a warm, welcome, and wonderous home here as well.

Introducing Linda Lannin

Six years ago, Linda Lannin joined our church after moving to Mont Vernon from Mason, where she had been a longtime active member of the Mason Congregational Church. Looking for a new church, Linda was attracted to The Congregational Church of Amherst because of the quality of the pastors, the music, and the sense of community.

Linda encourages church members to get involved in both our church and the wider church. She has served in the lay leadership of the NH Conference of the UCC, and is currently a member of its Board of Directors as Budget Coordinator. She has also served on various Committees of the



Hillsborough Association and as its Moderator. She has found working at these levels of our denomination to be a rich experience, which has given her a much broader understanding of how the NH Conference and all its churches are interconnected. She highly recommends attending the Conference's *Prepared to Serve* program for its workshops and fellowship. Although not a presenter herself at this year's *Prepared to Serve*, Linda reports that two CCA members, Tom Werst and Herb Archer, will be making a presentation on how churches can switch to renewable resources.

Linda has also become involved in the leadership of our church by serving for several years on the Stewardship Team. She admits that she was hesitant at first when asked to join Stewardship, but is now glad to be a part of it. She has found the team's outreach to church members about pledging well received. This year's pledge drive will be starting soon, with March 19th the date of Faith Promise Sunday.

Linda has been active in our church's Racial Justice Group since it first started as a book study almost three years ago. The group is now reaching out to promote racial justice in the wider community. In February of 2024 our church will host an exhibit of the Sacred Allied Quilts, a project of nine NH UCC churches, whose members made quilts reflecting George Floyd's last words. Chris Owen, who was formerly associated with CCA, and whom Linda knew when he was pastor at the Mason church, has made a movie about the quilt project, which will be shown while the display is at our church.

An Occupational Therapist her entire career, Linda works for the Hollis Public Schools. She and her husband John, who have been married 34 years, live with their dog, Bodi. They are the parents of Ross, a United States Marine Corps helicopter pilot, and Katie, a business manager at Lincoln Labs. Maintaining physical fitness is important to Linda. The Woman's Association dates back to 1865 and since then has engaged women in supporting the church and community organizations and in building a sense of fellowship among our members.

For most of the year the WA holds "workshops" on Monday mornings from 10:00 to noon. Attendees may work on crafts, plan for future activities, socialize or some combination of these activities. You can also bring a lunch and share a time of fellowship. Membership is open to all women of all ages, church members **and** non-church members, and activities are open to members **and** guests.

An Abbreviated History of The Woman's Association

This year the Woman's Association (WA) celebrates their 158th anniversary! In the tradition of those before them, the WA proudly continues to make a difference in the lives of those less fortunate by adhering to their mission statement, *"To cultivate the spirit of Christ beginning with our own lives and reaching out into the home, community and throughout the world."*

The WA evolved from a woman's group organized to financially assist the church by the minister's wife in 1865. Many of its members were involved in earlier church women's groups dedicated to charitable and educational projects. There are documents and records as far back as 1836 that chronicle the history of these early organizations leading to The Woman's Association of 2023.

Following is a brief overview of these early groups.

The Amherst Ladies Association for Education Society was organized October 7, 1836, as part of the national American Education Society formed in 1815. The westward expansion of the U.S. and the worldwide deployment of missionaries created a need for more ministers. The purpose of the Education Society was to raise funds for impoverished young men who distinguished themselves as scholars but had no means to attend divinity school. The Amherst Ladies raised a total of \$220.52 over 7 years until they disbanded in 1843.

The Female Cent Society of Amherst, formed on May 11, 1840, was also part of a national organization. The Society's purpose was to raise money for home and foreign missionaries, "...to be spent on some object of Charity to be determined at a regular meeting of the Society". Their first year, forty-nine members, paid their annual dues of 52 cents (1 cent per week), and with an additional donation, contributed \$29.56. After 86 years, dues never changing from 1 cent per week, the chapter closed in March 1926 due to decreasing membership. The remaining members accepted an invitation to join the **Ladies Charitable Association**.

The Ladies Sewing Circle was organized May 12, 1847. The stated purpose of the group was "...feeling that practicable effort in the cause of benevolence is worthy to be made - that no hand should willingly be idle, which can be exerted for the promotion of good..." Dues were 25 cents annually and it was acceptable to pay your contribution in the equivalent of cloth, thread, or yarn. Sixty-four women joined that first year, many of whom were Female Cent Society members. They opened meetings with a scripture reading and hymn, and ladies read articles while they sewed. Their handmade objects and clothing, household items, and any gently used clothing left at the parsonage were sent to needy missionaries and their families in such far-away places such as Minnesota, Wisconsin, and Ohio. The suffering and despair of the Civil War cast long shadows on the Amherst women and their work. In April 1862, Secretary Abba A. Spalding Davis the wife of Rev. J. Gardner Davis, the 7th minister of the Congregational Church from 1844 to 1880, included the following sentiment in her annual report, "The State of our country will probably continue to affect the prosperity of Home Missions and there will be a necessity for efforts of a like nature or the cause will go backward. It must be the conviction of every Christian and thoughtful mind that nothing but the prevalence of the principles of the gospel can ever make this a safe, tranquil and happy land again. Treason and rebellion may be overcome by force, but to have kindness, justice and humanity reign in the hearts of the people must be the result of a higher and different influence." Perhaps the women focused their efforts making items for the Union soldiers, because no annual meetings were held in 1863 or 1864, and the group disbanded in June 1865. The final Treasurer's Report stating the 32 members gave \$33.48 to "destitute families of Ministers in New Hampshire".

The Ladies Charitable Association (LCA) was organized in October 1865 by Mrs. Abba A. Spalding Davis, the minister's wife and previously secretary of the Sewing Circle. Many members were from the Sewing Circle. The women raised important funds paying for such items as church debt, insurance, apportionment, the pastor's salary, new pianos, grand piano renovations, the Red Cross, Congregational missionary work in Puerto Rico and India, the stricken Indians in the Dakotas, donations to the Children's Aid and Protective Society, school dental clinics, calendars, decorations, altar floral arrangements, and clothing and bedding for the Amherst needy including hand-made comforters. In fact, the Amherst women took first place for their handwork in a 1932 state competition against other Congregational woman's organizations. Activities included luncheons, suppers, candidates' forums, rummage sales, holiday fairs, lectures, musical programs, bridge tournaments, and writing and selling cookbooks. After absorbing the Woman's Missionary Society and The Female Cent Society and 62 years of service, in 1928 the Ladies Charitable Association was re-organized and named The Woman's Association of the Congregational Church.

In its heyday, the WA had 171 members in 1979. Small but mighty, today's WA is comprised of 29 active members. The WA's fundraising abilities and accomplishments have thrived under President Adrienne Topliffe's leadership since 2004. Current activities include luncheons, lectures, rummage sales and the Holiday Fair. The women also maintain and support the kitchen and its equipment, purchasing items from utensils to paper towels, to kitchen stools, and oversee, manage, and staff funeral receptions. The Monday morning workshops find them enjoying each other's company, while working on creative projects such as knitting, crocheting, birch bark houses, or sorting and cleaning donated items. They learned the art of adaptation during Covid by getting together Monday mornings on Zoom and holding two successful virtual Holiday Fair auctions.
