Nurturing

Jesus said, "Let the children come to me, and do not stop them, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to them." - Matthew 19:14

Making space for children in church can be a challenge. Children below a certain age often have trouble sitting still and keeping quiet while in worship, and can, at times, seem "out of control." They stand on the pews, run up and down the aisles, talk during the sermon, drop hymnals during the time for silent prayer, and impolitely stare at those sitting behind them.

These unruly progenies often need to be bribed into behaving - with snacks, coloring pages, and favorite toys brought from home. But these intended distractions may only encourage more mayhem. As our littlest worshippers scribble on the pew Bibles, make bullhorns out of the bulletins, leave Goldfish crumbs on the carpet, and wrestle with their siblings over who gets to play with what.

Even the intentional "Children's Time" we have during worship can be a challenge. As the kids run back and forth to their parents, wrestle with their siblings (again), interrupt the pastor with unrelated questions or comments, or show no interest in participating in whatever "lesson" they're supposed to be learning.

Yes, having children in church can be a challenge.

Yet children in church are not nearly as challenging as the adults can sometimes be.

I've never heard a child say:

"You're new here, your opinion doesn't matter."

"We tried that before and it didn't work."

"We don't have enough money to do that."

I've never heard a child complain:

"Why are the younger members always too busy to help? They don't value what we do."

"Why do we have that rainbow on our building? It's too divisive."
"Why are we talking about racism, economic disparities, or other socalled injustices in church? Can't we just hear the gospel?"

I've never heard a child question why we talk about, listen to, reach out to, or welcome someone not like us. I've never heard a child claim that someone was too new, or too young, or too marginalized to matter. I've never heard a child say our hopes and dreams and missions as a church were too big, or too hard, or too costly to even try.

Yes, children, like adults, can be overly cautious, fearful and pessimistic when faced with something new or different. And children are just as capable of engaging in bullying, exclusionary, or mean-girl/boy behavior with others. But with children, we're more likely to notice, call out, and attempt to correct these limiting mindsets and harmful behaviors when we

Fredrick Douglass Statewide Readings July 1st

Sponsored by the Black Heritage Trail Hosted by the CCA Racial Justice Group

Returning this year! The Fredrick Douglass Statewide Readings event, sponsored by the Black Heritage Trail of NH, is a re-enactment of a speech that Frederick Douglass, an abolitionist and heroic orator for liberty, delivered on July 5, 1852. It is one of his most famous speeches in which he asked, "What to the slave is your Fourth of July?" In addressing an Independence Day observance in Rochester, New York, his speech was a blistering indictment of an American idealism that ignored and accepted the inhuman treatment of enslaved African Americans as part of the country's identity and economy. Ironically, even though Douglass' words spoke directly to this moment in history, they still ring with an unsettling power today.

This year's event will take place on Saturday, July 1st at 12:00 Noon on the front steps of the Congregational Church of Amherst which overlooks the historic Amherst Village Green.

see them. With children, we're also more hopeful that they'll eventually grow out of it and learn to see the world in a broader, more loving, compassionate, and grace-filled way.

Thankfully, I've rarely heard any of the adults in our congregation complain about the challenges of having children in church. Instead, I've heard the opposite, as we lift up a prayer of gratitude that we have children - to run in the aisles, to ask unexpected questions, to add their voices to our worship. Also, thankfully, only on the rare occasion have I heard of someone in our congregation treating another unkindly or dismissively, and even rarer still, is it done intentionally. It does happen, however, as all churches are places where we learn how to live in community.

On June 4th, Children's Sunday, we're celebrating the youngest, younger, and young at heart members of our faith community: our Church School Children, our Confirmands, and our Christian Education leaders, teachers, and volunteers. Pastor Kate, and our wonderful Church School Coordinator, Larissa, have put together a service that welcomes the participation of our children throughout, as this year we've made a concerted effort to include our children in all parts of worship.

Throughout the year, we've been focusing on the many parts of our worship and the function they serve - Welcoming, Praying, Singing, Sending, Healing, Communing, Giving, Listening, Discerning - and on Children's Sunday, we'll celebrate our final theme: Nurturing. The Children's Time is the time we set aside during worship for a child's-eyeview of the lesson of the day. It might be connected to scripture, or an outreach effort, or a ritual happening in worship. The time and the message is meant for our kids, but there are adults who say they regularly get more out of the Children's Time than the sermon. Simply because it's more memorable, more engaging, or more understandable than the message designed for adults. And that's something to celebrate. Part of our goal in worship is to nurture the faith of all ages. If we walk out of worship feeling like we've learned something, felt something, or been reminded yet again that God loves us, then it doesn't matter which part of worship got us there.

June 4th is also Pastor Kate's last Sunday with our congregation. As we celebrate the many gifts she brings to ministry in her pastoral presence, her preaching, and her leadership, we also celebrate the legacy she is leaving behind: Two thriving youth groups, for our middle schoolers and high schoolers, that she nurtured through the pandemic and resurrected on the other side. Our Confirmation class, which she co-led, nurturing the faith of teens who are choosing to say "yes" to becoming members of our community, walking in the way of Jesus. And the Parent's Group, which Kate started five years ago and nurtured through a natural life cycle with those who asked for it and needed it when their children were young. We are grateful for all that Kate has given us and we send our blessings with her, to wherever God calls her.

I encourage you to join us for worship on June 4th. Even if you're among those who see children in church as a challenge. There will likely be running in the aisles, wiggling in the pews, and a chorus of little voices being raised at unexpected times. And who knows, as adults we may just learn something from our children, and allow God's Spirit to move in us in the same welcoming and joyful way.

A Note from Pastor Kate

Dear Congregational Church of Amherst,

I can hardly believe this is my last *Spire* article! These past months have flown right by. I have just loved being your pastor, but I didn't completely realize how much this place means to me until this last month. Thank you so much for your endless support and care. This church is such a healthy, thriving, kind community, and it has been such a joy to be here as your pastor, teacher, and friend.

I want to offer a brief word about departing boundaries. When I was ordained in our beautiful sanctuary, I promised to uphold our UCC Ministerial Code. This code of personal and communal standards leads to healthy relationships for pastors and churches alike. Within that code are boundaries for the pastor's leave-taking, specifically: "Not perform pastoral services within a congregation, or for a member of a congregation, without the invitation of the current pastor of that congregation." And: "Neither interfere with nor intrude upon the ministry of my successor, upon my departure from a ministry setting."

Here's what this means to me: After June, I'll be stepping away from the Congregational Church of Amherst. I won't come back for worship or events, I won't pop in online, and I won't follow the goings on from afar, at least for a while. Before I leave, I will pass all of the information I hold to Pastor Maureen, Larissa, Andrea, or Sara, so that as few things fall through the cracks as possible. This makes me sad, but I would be even more sad if I was to interfere with the next AP's thriving!
