By faith Abraham obeyed when he was called to set out for a place that he was to receive as an inheritance; and he set out, not knowing where he was going. By faith he stayed for a time in the land he had been promised, as in a foreign land, living in tents, as did Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. For he looked forward to the city that has foundations, whose architect and builder is God. By faith he received power of procreation, even though he was too old—and Sarah herself was barren—because he considered him faithful who had promised. Therefore from one person, and this one as good as dead, descendants were born, "as many as the stars of heaven and as the innumerable grains of sand by the seashore."

All of these died in faith without having received the promises, but from a distance they saw and greeted them. They confessed that they were strangers and foreigners on the earth, for people who speak in this way make it clear that they are seeking a homeland. If they had been thinking of the land that they had left behind, they would have had opportunity to return. But as it is, they desire a better country, that is, a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God; indeed, he has prepared a city for them.

Historical Notes

Reprinted from page seven of the 250th Anniversary Edition THE MANUAL

The Congregational Church of Amherst, New Hampshire

The first settlers in Amherst, like pioneers in many other parts of the new country, had to endure many hardships before the land could be conquered, homes established, and a safe community life assured. "A howling wilderness it was, where no man dwelt, the hideous yell of wolves, the shriek of owls, the gobbling of turkeys, and the barking of foxes, was all the music we heard..." But the settlers brought with them the courage of a strong faith in God. They carried the church in their hearts, and just as soon as it was humanly possible to erect it, the church building was visibly established where all within the town might join to worship God and receive the ministry of the Word. Until the church was built preaching services were held in the homes of the people.

The first meeting house became a project in 1735, and in "Upper Flanders" a stone marks the site where its plain exterior, without porch or steeple, could be viewed with quiet gladness, and within, though the building was without lath or plaster until later years, the people had great comfort in the ministry of the Word. The first definite organization of the church was in the year 1741 when Daniel Wilkins was selected to be the minister of the town, and he, with Samuel Leman, Israel Towne, Samuel Lamson, Caleb Stiles, and Humphrey Hobbs, associated themselves as charter members of the church. Following the ordination and installation of the Reverend Daniel Wilkins, Mrs. Sarah Wilkins, Mrs. Grace Towne, Mrs. Abigail Lamson, Mary Leman, Hannah Lancy, and Rebecca Walton, were received into the membership of the church.

The church building, begun in 1735, was not fully completed until 1753. It saw much service in religion, law, and debate, for it was the "Town House" as well as the church, a veritable "meeting-house" serving the varied needs of the growing community, later becoming, after the building of the new and larger church, the first county court house, a close neighbor on the "Plain" of the new meeting house until it was destroyed by fire in 1788.

In 1770 the people of the town voted to build another meeting house, changing the location from Upper Flanders to the Training Field on the Plain. This new building, our present church, framed with massive timbers hewn from trees grown near by, was built a little to the southeast of its present location, with the steeple at the west end, and a porch at the east end. The pulpit was on the north side of the church with a massive sounding board high above it. The new meeting house was dedicated on January 19, 1774.

Original Covenant from 1741

The Congregational Church of Amherst was organized on September 22, 1741 (282 years ago). Below is a partial photo of the original covenant, along with a translation of the full covenant.



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Church Book Ex dono Ioannei Shepard jus. Pacis The Church in Amherst imbodied the 22 of September 1741. the Covenant is as followeth viz

- "1. We do this day solemnly and explicitly enter into covenant with God and with one another in the following manner in the place we give ourselves up to God, the Father, Son, and Holy Ghost, as the only living and true God, and unto Jesus Christ our only Saviour, Prophet, Priest, and King, avouching the Lord to be our God, and by the assistance of his Holy Spirit to cleave unto this one God and Mediator, as persons in solemn covenant with him.
- 2. We also promise to give up our natural offspring to the Lord, solemly binding ourselves to walk together in the ways of God's worship, and to cleave to his ordinances according to the rules of his word.
- 3. We promise to live in the mortification of our sin, and to endeavour the mortification of it in others, so far as the rules require, and to submit ourselves to the government of Christ in his church, and obey the orders thereof.
 - 4. We promise to train up all under our care in the nurture and admonition of the Lord.
 - 5. We promise to walk before God in our houses, and maintain the worship of God therein.
- 6. We promise to study to maintain the peace and purity of the worship of God with us, that the blessing of God may be vouchsafed to this part of his heritage."



What is Small Group Ministry?

Small Group Ministry is where 8-10 people meet with the intention of establishing deeper connections with each other and with God.

Allows for deeper conversations that we can't always have in committee meetings or during coffee hour.

The groups meet once a month from October to June, and are led by lay members of the congregation.

The group meetings run 1.5 hours and include a check-in, a short topic reading, discussion of the topic, and closing prayer.
