Our children will participate in the beginning of the service before heading off to church school to engage the theme in their class time.

Why Church?

Here's a question I invite you to ask of yourself: Why is being a part of a church important to you? Are you looking for connection, community, to be a part of something larger than yourself?

Are you seeking spiritual guidance or understanding, for yourself or your children, as you navigate the challenges of living in today's world? Do you find comfort, enjoyment, or inspiration in gathering on Sunday mornings - in the music, in scripture, in ritual, in reflecting upon how God is speaking to us and moving us to respond? Do you feel called to serve others and being a part of a church provides the opportunity to do more in a more meaningful way?

There are many reasons why being a part of a church may be important to us. And the order of importance we place on the reasons given above may be different for each one of us and may change over time. On Sunday, October 27, we're hosting a Second Hour discussion after worship where we'll pose the question, "Why Church?" to share our own responses to this question and to hear how others respond as well. We'll also explore how our collective response to this question as a society has changed over time and continues to change in our time. What drove our Christian forebearers to build church communities? Why are fewer and fewer people seeking to be a part of church communities today? What role might the church play in people's lives in the years to come?

Our church mission statement contains the phrase "Serving neighbors near and far." Following is a summary of our efforts to fulfill that mission for the last six months (March - August). Where relevant, website information is noted for those who would like to know more about the organizations to which we have made donations.

The Homestarter Program continues to help newly housed individuals and families with donations of furniture and household goods. Heartfelt thanks to all the volunteers from our church and the wider community who contribute time and labor to this program. (https://www.ccamherst.org/homestarter/)

The Woman's Association had their annual Good Stuff Sale in April, providing the community with an opportunity to buy good gently used clothing and household items at very low cost. As in years past, Home Starter, Milford Rotary, Pass Along Project and Animal Rescue League were given items free of charge. Needed items were also donated to the First United Methodist Church of Manchester for its homeless mission.

What is Small Group Ministry?

These are big questions, and they're a part of the larger conversation that our "Widening Our Welcome" team initiated last spring. Last April, on "Belonging Sunday," we explored what it means to belong to a community and then gathered for a workshop to ask some hard questions about why some find barriers to belonging, in our church or in any church. The reasons why some are NOT a part of a faith community are as varied as the reasons we give for why we are here. There are spiritual, emotional and physical barriers that directly or indirectly communicate to others, "You don't belong here." As a congregation, we'll continue to explore what those barriers may be, and how we might lessen or remove them, so those seeking a church community for any of the reasons above might find a sense of belonging here.

Throughout this coming program year, our WOW team will host conversations like the one on October 27th, in preparation for a church-wide workshop that will take place next spring, where we'll focus on "Finding Our Why" as a congregation. Why are we a church together? How is our collective "why" expressed in our worship, our relationships, and in the work we do in our community? How might we invite others to join us on our journey?

If you can't make the after-worship discussion on October 27, we'll have other opportunities to gather in November and after the new year. All are invited to attend these conversations, and you're welcome to attend one or attend them all, to learn more about why others are a part of our community and to share your reasons as well.

If you talk to any of the newer members of our church community (or if you are one yourself) you'll discover that their reasons for seeking us out are not much different than what may have brought you here. It is part of our human condition to "long to belong" and despite declining involvement in faith communitas as a whole, there's still a spiritual longing that many have to be a part of something larger than oneself. Why haven't others found that belonging in our community? Why might they not even be looking in our direction? How might we widen our welcome – in our hearts and in our minds, in our building and in our surrounding community – as the loving, grace-filled church that God calls us to be?

Join us on October 27th - to add your voice to our conversation, or to just listen and learn.

Congregational Meeting Sunday, October 13, 2024 Following the Worship Service



Also, the WA gave \$500 to Pass Along Project and \$250 to Meals on Wheels Hillsborough County. (ww.hcmow.org)

The Church School made donations from weekly offerings to SHARE and End 68 Hours of Hunger (end68hoursofhunger.org), an organization working to fill the food gap experienced by some children between school lunch on Friday and school breakfast on Monday.

There were several community events we participated in and/or organized. The *Sacred Ally Quilt display* was held at the Unitarian-Universalist Community in Milford, co-sponsored by the Racial Justice Team at CCA and funded in part by a donation from the newly created Special Ministry Project Fund. That fund also provided money for our congregation's participation in *Milford Pride*. A public reading of the Frederick Douglass speech "*What to the Slave is the Fourth of July*" was held in front of the church on June 29. We also continued our participation in the town celebration of the *Fourth of July*. The Christian Education staff and committee offered *Vacation Bible School* in August, with many children from the community outside our church participating.

Donations of various amounts were made from the Mission Fund to organizations listed here:

- \$1,000 to the Nashua Children's Home Capital Campaign (www.nashuachidrenshome.org) for a new playground.
- \$1,000 to Welcoming NH (www.welcomingnh.org) a coalition that works with immigrants and refugees.
- \$500 to Victory Women of Vision (www.victorywomenof vision.org), a mentoring program that encourages, empowers and nurtures immigrant and refugee families.
- \$1,500 for Home Starter storage units (balance of the fiscal year).
- \$1,000 to NH4Ukraine (www.nh4ukraine.org), an organization that purchases relief supplies in Ukraine and distributes direct aid to Ukrainian children and families.
- \$500 to Waypoint (www.waypointnh.org), a social service organization based in Manchester
- \$1,000 to the Souhegan Valley Boys and Girls Club (svbgc.org).

Our outreach attempts to address many persistent needs in the world, and we are able to do far more as a faith community than we could as individuals. Knowledge and understanding will grow and as a result, racism will diminish.

Banned, Burned, and Buried: The Books NOT in the Bible

Wednesdays, October 2 & 16 10:00-11:30 a.m. on Zoom

This fall, we began a year-long video lecture series delving into the "lost" books of the Bible.

We'll explore the Gnostic gospels and other writings NOT in our New Testament that offer alternative understandings of who Jesus was, who and what God is, and what our spiritual purpose is as created beings. We'll also look at the books of the Old Testament that are in some Bibles but not in others, including stories of giants, dragons, and fallen angels.

In each session, we'll watch a video together as a group and then have a discussion facilitated by Pastor Maureen. The class will meet every first and third Wednesday at 10:00 a.m. on Zoom.
