### Living with Purpose

In my previous life, before I became a pastor, I worked in a bike shop selling parts and accessories to fellow cycling enthusiasts; I served as an apprentice audio engineer in various recording studios in NYC; I was a purchasing agent for a clothing manufacturer, buying fabrics and zippers and finished goods from overseas; I stocked shelves and served customers in a bookstore; and I put listings up on eBay for an internet consignment shop. I have no doubt that many of you would be able to assemble an equally eclectic list of the "work" you've done in your life, from menial labors to jobs that "paid the bills" to chosen careers and retirement passions.

Much ado is often made about the need for us to find our purpose in life through our work. Along with the pressure we feel as young adults to figure out what we want "to do with our lives" comes the life-long expectation that the work we do should align with our gifts and passions, and it should bring joy and happiness not just to ourselves but to those around us. But what if it doesn't? Does this mean we're not living up to our potential? That we're not walking the path that God intended us to walk? What if we can't work (for various reasons) or no longer work? Are we meant to find some other way to fill our lives with "doing" - to make our lives purposeful in service to God and others?

Our church-wide theme this year encourages us to build "An Altar in the World" as we practice our faith outside of our church walls. In January, we're focusing on "The Practice of Living with Purpose." In reflecting on this

practice, the Reverend Barbara Brown Taylor encourages us to look back on the work we've done in life - and the work we do now - and see all of it as an invitation to live into our purpose, regardless of the nature of the work. Taylor credits Martin Luther, the instigator of the Protestant Reformation, with naming our communal purpose as Christians: to love God and our neighbor as we love ourselves. Jesus had something to say about that as well. If this is our true purpose as people of faith, then all of our work offers us an opportunity to live into it. Every job, every calling, every vocation, every unpaid passion that we share with others offers us an invitation to amplify love - in acts of kindness, patience, generosity, compassion, joy, mercy, and grace.

On Sunday, January 19th, we'll explore the Practice of Living with Purpose in our morning worship. If you're feeling like you're struggling to find your purpose or feel like you're falling short of it, or if you've found it later in life but can't see how the list of previous work you've done aligns with that purpose, we invite you to bring all those longings and lackings with you as we gather. God loves us as we are. God works through us as we are. God also invites us to be more than we are, as we connect our purpose with God's purpose - which is to love.


Through church, we may find a way to live into that purpose – serving in worship, singing in the choir, tending to the building, serving at coffee hour, hauling furniture for the Home Starter Program, teaching in Church School, working with the WOW or Racial Justice Groups, as a member of the Woman's Association.

Outside of church, we may find ways to live into that purpose as well volunteering in the community, serving on non-profit boards, collecting clothing or food for those in need, sharing our passions with others and spreading joy as a result.

Yet, living with purpose is something we have an opportunity to practice no matter what we're "doing" - standing in line at the grocery store, driving in rush hour traffic, responding to someone on the internet who said something we disagree with.

In this post-Christmas season of Epiphany, and in the upcoming Stewardship season (yet again!) we'll hear a lot about what it means to reveal the light of Christ through our work as a church and through our giving – of our gifts and passions as well as our treasure. Our passions do provide opportunities to serve, and to give, and to live into our purpose. Yet, as Martin Luther, and Jesus, remind us, when we align our true purpose (love) with God's purpose (love), there's no limit to how or when or where we live into it.

### **Caregiver's Circle**

Are you providing caregiving to a family member, in your home, living away or long distance? Would you be interested in participating in a Caregivers Circle Support Group with others who are on a similar journey as you?

Being a caregiver brings many emotional, physical, and financial tolls on the most loving person. Confidentiality and respect for one another is key in supporting our journeys as caregivers. Discussions are on coping, resources, advocacy, and all aspects of being a caregiver.

Caregiver's Circle is led by Rev. Charlotte Bell MDIV, MSW. Charlotte is an ordained minister in the United Church of Christ, with a Certificate in Spiritual and Pastoral Care. She has spent 33 years as a medical social worker, specializing in end-of-life support, bereavement, grief, Geriatrics, Oncology and Perinatal Loss. Charlotte worked as a Medical Social Worker with a focus on gerontology, having worked in a variety of senior residential settings. She has been trained and certified to support Alzheimer's patients, families, and caregivers.

Our first Caregivers Circle monthly support group meeting will be held on Tuesday, January 21, 2025, 10:00 am -11:30 am in the church parlor, on the second floor, accessible by the rear entrance of the church by taking the elevator or stairs. Light refreshments will be provided.

### **Senior Youth Group Mission Trip**

The SYG has scheduled their annual Mission Trip. This June, a group of 15 teens (current 8th - 12th graders) will be traveling with adult advisors to Western NC or Eastern TN to assist with disaster recovery efforts in the areas devastated by Hurricane Helene. The exact location will be determined in the coming months, but it will be in the vicinity of Asheville, NC. The trip is being organized through *Experience Mission*, a faith-based organization that connects volunteers to local groups serving in areas of need.

### **144 Envelopes Fundraiser**

On January 19th, the SYG will be kicking off the *144 Envelopes Fundraiser* to help pay for the 2025 Hurricane Helene Relief Mission Trip. After worship, be sure to visit the Bulletin Board in the Community Room to learn more about the trip and check out the numbered envelopes decorated by the teens. It's easy to support the trip: just choose an envelope from 1 to 144 and make a donation in the amount equal to the number you chose. If you only have \$5 to give, or your child wants to donate \$1, that's great! We need every envelope to be selected in order to reach our goal of \$10,000. We are grateful for every dollar given.



### **Governments For and By the People**

As we prepare for a new United States government administration to be installed in January, 2025, it is interesting to explore how the Abenaki Peoples, who inhabited the lands we now live on, successfully governed their lands for more than two thousand years before the European settlers arrived. Their governmental structure was consensus-based, and decisions were made by majority rule only. The Abenaki's followed a set of unwritten laws that were passed down through each generation. Punishment for disobeying the laws of the tribe were often severe, including banishment from the tribe. Physical punishment may also be used, including having the accused run through parallel lines of braves with clubs who would aim a blow on the culprit's body. These enforcements were engaged according to tribal customs and traditions, employing both shame and disgrace to ensure that rules were followed.

Some of the components of Abenaki government are described below.

### **Consensus-based Decision Making**

Important decisions were made through group discussion. Band (tribe) members talked through the positive and negative aspects of a decision until an agreement was reached. The chief facilitated this discussion but did not determine the outcome; the members of the tribe made the ultimate choice following ongoing dialogue.

### **Band or Tribe Structure**

The Abenaki society was divided into smaller family groups. Each small kinbased group or band was led by a civil chief. The chief advised the group and facilitated consensus-based decision making. A general council consisted of all adult men and women in the tribe, and they decided matters related to war. A smaller council of chiefs and representatives from each family decided other questions of importance to the group.

### **Civil Chief**

Each band or family group had a civil chief responsible for guiding the group and facilitating decisions through group consensus. The chief elders were chosen for their wisdom and leadership abilities, and always commanded respect. However, a chief seldom made decisions without the ultimate approval and advice from the members of the chief's tribal bands.

### **Elderly Influence**

The elders in a band played a significant role in decision-making and preserving the cultural traditions of a band. Tribe members looked to their elders for guidance, especially around issues of cultural preservation.
