

## The Practice of Being Present to God

How often do you converse with God? Having a conversation with God implies that we are actively speaking and listening, just as we do in any conversation. We may converse easily with those we know and love – sharing what is on our minds and hearts as we make space to then hear what is on their minds and hearts. Yet with God, we may experience stumbling blocks to having such a conversation. Especially when we label that conversation as "prayer." Prayer assumes a level of formality, or reverence, or appropriateness that we don't often apply to our everyday conversations. And therein lies the problem.

Prayer is a central practice within the Christian faith, yet outside of formal worship we may struggle to embrace prayer as a regular practice, or even as an irregular practice. It's the how, what, where, and why questions that often leave us restricting our practice of prayer to Sunday mornings, when those questions are much easier to answer. How do we pray? What do we pray? Where do we pray? Why do we pray?

On Sunday mornings, most of the prayers we say in worship are scripted. We join in a unison prayer of invocation, as we acknowledge God's presence among us. We say a prayer of dedication over our offering, and a prayer of thanksgiving after we receive Communion. During Lent, we add a prayer of confession to our worship, to shift our focus onto the ways in which God calls us towards healing and wholeness. And every Sunday, we recite the Lord's Prayer together - the prayer that Jesus taught us to say, which is a bundling together of many prayers in one: praise, thanksgiving, confession, contrition, submission, and intercession on behalf of the needs of others.

The lifting up of our joys and concerns during worship is our opportunity to share unscripted prayers (i.e. prayers composed by the people rather than the pastor). But not everyone feels comfortable sharing such prayers in public. Some choose to submit written prayers (on average 3-5 prayer cards are collected during our Sunday service). Others prefer to lift up their joys and concerns privately during the time we allot for silent prayers. Yet, what to pray and how to pray it may escape us in the moment. Which is why I suspect there are a good number of us who use that time to think about what comes next in the service, or where we're going afterward, or any number of things that our minds may wander to in the minute or so of breathing space we're given.


Outside of Sunday morning worship, we may not have much breathing space at all, for prayer or any formal faith practice. With all the coming and going and doing and checking the next thing off the list, that occupies our time outside of Sunday mornings. Let's pause here and stress that naming this struggle is not about shaming. To even make time for a communal worship service on Sunday morning is to swim against the current of our culture. The hour or two we give to God on Sunday morning is evidence of our desire to keep that relationship on the front burner. And when we add the hours of "giving to God by giving to others" that we may do outside of Sunday morning, we have reason to resist any suggestion that we're somehow not doing "enough" when it comes to practicing our faith.

Yet, we have much to gain if we create just a bit more breathing space that allows us to be more present to God. Let's set aside the word "prayer" for a moment and go back to what we already know how to do well: engaging in conversations. What would it look like if you adopted a practice of talking to and listening to God that was as informal and effortless as talking and listening to a beloved member of your family or a good friend? Instead of immediately reaching for the phone or sending off a text to those you know and trust when you're struggling with something, or feeling anxious or angry, or even feeling thankful for some good fortune, what if you reached out to God first? What if in that moment you said, "Hey God....Thanks!" or "Help!" or "Wow!" or "Whoops!" or "Why?" What if you then shared what is on your heart, as if God were sitting across from you at the kitchen table, nursing a cup of tea and nodding along as you speak. What if you then took the time to listen to God's response. Which, like a good friend, may be just to say, "I hear you, I'm with you, and I love you."

Developing a "practice of being present to God" in this way may not feel like prayer in a traditional sense, but it truly is. On Sunday, February 16<sup>th</sup>, during our monthly worship where we focus on building "An Altar in the World," we'll explore the practice of prayer. We'll acknowledge the struggle we may have with adopting such a practice and give voice to the how, what, where, and why questions that often leave us stumbling and fumbling in our effort to build a relationship with God outside of Sunday morning. If you're like me, you may already have a practice of talking to yourself. Wondering aloud as you go about your daily duties. Asking yourself, "What am I doing?" "How am I feeling?" "What is wrong with this world?" and "What can I do to make it better?" Those are big questions to ask, even of yourself. What would happen if you invited God into the conversation?



#### True Love Leads to Freedom

Ellen was a talented seamstress in the mid-1800's who was enslaved by a Master who was also her father. She fell in love with William, an enslaved cabinetmaker from a different household in Macon, Georgia. Both Ellen and William had experienced traumatic separations from loved ones - Ellen was given to the Master's daughter and thus separated from her own mother while William saw his only remaining sibling sold at a public auction when they were only children. Ellen and William met secretly whenever they could such as on their trips to the market and while engaging in other activities for their masters. Over many months they concocted a daring and courageous plan that eventually allowed them to live a free life as husband and wife, and to raise their children in freedom as well.



Master Slave Husband Wife: An Epic Journey from Slavery to Freedom by Ilyon Woo is a true story about Ellen and William Craft's remarkable journey from their life of bondage in Georgia to the free states of the north and eventually to England. It is a story of love and commitment as well as grit and determination to escape the life of slavery they were originally destined to endure. Since Ellen was a light-skinned Black woman, she decided to play the role of a well to-do white gentleman who was an invalid. William, who was a dark-skinned Black man, acted as her 'slave' and attended to her needs on their journey north. As they prepared for their

journey, Ellen used her skills as a seamstress to fashion clothing befit for an aristocrat, including a handsome stove pipe hat. She swept up her hair under the hat, donned the britches of the day, wrapped her arm in a sling and placed bandages on her face and hands to further justify her medical needs.

Ellen, now posing as a wealthy disabled man, booked travel all the way to PA, then to Boston, and on to Canada on a series of trains, steamboats, and carriages. Along the way, steamboats were sometimes canceled and carriages were delayed, requiring quick thinking on the part of the Crafts. They were often required to find overnight housing to wait for the next mode of travel, all the while continuing to enact the roles they had selected as Master and Slave.

The Crafts had hoped to stay in Boston, as Massachusetts was considered a free state where Black people could live freely. However, at this time the Fugitive Slave Law was more strictly enforced; if an escaped slave was caught in any state, the pursuers were allowed to return the enslaved person to their rightful owners and receive compensation. So the Crafts moved further north to Canada and eventually gained passage to England where they could truly be free.

Along their journey the Crafts met many of the people who paved the way for all people to be free and pursue happiness in the United States. They enjoined hands with such abolitionists as Wendell Phillips, Frederick Douglas, Lewis and Harriet Hayden, and Robert Pervis. William and Ellen joined with William Wells Brown, another abolitionist and orator, to tell their story throughout New England and then overseas of enslavement and their daring escape. This story encouraged many people of the times to protest slavery, eventually leading to the Civil War and ultimate freedom for those enslaved. The Crafts eventually returned to Macon, Georgia, and Ellen was reunited with her mother.



#### What is Small Group Ministry?

Small Group Ministry is where 8-10 people meet with the intention of establishing deeper connections with each other and with God.

Small Groups allow for deeper conversations that we can't always have in committee meetings or during coffee hour. The groups meet once a month from October to June, and are led by our pastors. The group meetings run 1.5 hours and include a check-in, a short topic reading, discussion of the topic, and closing prayer.

### The Senior Youth Group is Planning a Mission Trip

On June 22nd, fifteen members of our church's Senior Youth Group, along with their adult advisors, will fly to Asheville, North Carolina to participate in a six-day mission trip. They will be assisting with disaster recovery in the western North Carolina and eastern Tennessee area, which was badly damaged by Hurricane Helene last fall. The group won't know ahead of time exactly where they will be working or what particular project they'll be working on until they arrive. Group leader, Larissa Riley, gave the group several options for places to go on this year's mission trip. The teens agreed that helping with Hurricane Helene recovery was their first choice. Experience Mission, a faith-based organization, will coordinate the details for the group once they arrive in Asheville.

This mission trip will be a new experience for most of the group. A few of the older teens had fun volunteering on the mission trip our youth group took to

New Orleans two years ago. On that trip the youth volunteered at several different places in the city, but on this year's trip they expect to work on one big project for their entire stay. The accommodations won't be luxurious. They'll spend nights sleeping on the floor of a school or church. Each evening they'll meet for worship and debriefing and they'll also connect with other volunteer groups.

One of Larissa's goals, as our church's Director of Youth Ministries, is to encourage the youth to participate in the life of our church. The Senior Youth Group has been very active recently helping at several church events, such as Breakfast with Santa, the WA Holiday Fair, and the CAV House Tour luncheon. They also volunteered at the Amherst Lions Club Spaghetti Dinner. By helping at church and community events and traveling hundreds of miles to do hurricane relief, the SYG is carrying out our church's motto, "Serving Neighbors Near and Far."

In order to finance this mission trip, the group kicked off their 144 Envelopes fundraiser on January 19th. Envelopes are posted on a bulletin board in the Community Room. Anyone who would like to donate to the cost of the trip should take an envelope and return it with the monetary amount that matches the number on the envelope. Donations can also be made using the church website. Any amount would be greatly appreciated.
