The box you check above may also provide insight into how you arrived at our church. For those who came 20 to 40+ years ago, the answer to this question is most often one of the following: "I grew up in this church" or, "I moved and went in search of a church" or, "I left my previous church and went in search of one that was a better fit." This search typically involved seeking out a congregation of a particular denomination or taking note of the churches one saw around town, or even looking in the Yellow Pages (there's a blast from the past), and through the trial-and-error process of "church shopping" a good fit was eventually found.

For those who've been here less than 20 years, and especially for those who've been here less than ten, the process of finding a church has looked much different. An internet search was likely involved, where one might get a sense of a church's identity by perusing its website - the welcome and belief statements, program descriptions, event announcements, outreach efforts, and newsletter and sermon archives. This "try before you buy" form of church shopping means that many of our new arrivals know a good deal about us before we've even met them. Yet, the "welcome" and sense of connection one feels upon arrival is still a key reason why visitors choose to return.

What sets our more recent arrivals apart from our more long-term attendees is the journey that preceded the search. Few people nowadays move to a new town and look for a new church in the same way they may look for a new dentist or hairdresser. And when people leave one church behind, more and more are choosing to not seek out another. Those who arrive on our doorstep today typically come after a long period of wondering and longing for some form of spiritual connection for themselves or for their children. They may have been raised in a church, or not. Their previous experience of church may have been benign, uninspired, exclusionary, or hurtful, giving them little reason to seek out another. They may have once held the assumption that most Christian churches are the same, based on their experience or what they see in the wider culture, and they saw no need to create space for one in their lives. Our historic white church on the green may have added ascetic value to their small-town experience but it was just a church like any other - one they drove by while running Sunday errands or while taking their kids to soccer games.

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

# Lenten Supper Series "Questions Jesus Asked"

Wednesday Evenings During Lent March 12, 19, 26 - April 2, 9, 16 6:30-8:00 p.m.



Join us on six Wednesday evenings during Lent as we gather for a simple supper of soup and bread and explore six questions that Jesus asked in our Gospels that reflect the joys and challenges of being human:

"Why are you afraid?" (Matthew 8:23-27)
"Why are you anxious?" (Luke 12:25-31)
"What are you looking for?" (John 1:35-38)
"What do you live for?" (Mark 8:34-38)
"Whom will you love?" (Luke 6:27-36)
"Who do you say that I am?" (Luke 9:18-20)

How might you respond to each of these questions? How might our faith guide us as we seek clarity?

We'll gather in the second floor parlor for soup and then watch a short video before engaging in an informal discussion facilitated by Pastor Maureen. What sets most of our more recent arrivals apart is this: they discovered something about our church and how we are different before they even thought to step through our doors. Some came because trusted neighbors and friends attend here, and as always, a personal recommendation or connection goes a long way. Some came because they stumbled across our livestream online, and they took note of our message, our welcome, our outreach, our music, or the presence of children and youth, and after watching for a while, realized that our community was one they wanted to be a part of. Some came because they noticed something different about how we presented ourselves to the community - on our website, at our table on the Fourth of July, on the banner we hung on our church every year just before Rally Day: our "Welcoming to All", our "God's Doors are Open to All", our rainbow - which many have said told them instantly that they would be welcome, their family would be welcome, that we offered an inclusive understanding of God's love that matched the values they wanted to teach their children.

And when I say, "many" have said this, I do mean many. Because I've been hearing this from a good number of our more recent arrivals. I recently sat down and made a list of those who've explicitly said they're here because of our rainbow-inspired welcome, and I filled two pages of a legal pad with names. People who've showed up on our doorstep in the last five to ten years who are now active in our church school, our choirs, our outreach, our Deacons, our Woman's Association, and in our wider community.

Some may question the effectiveness of websites and banners and signs and rainbows - and rightfully so, as these things were at one time not needed, or they feel too much like secular marketing or pandering, or because they may even turn some people off. Rainbows in particular make some uncomfortable because of an implied political ideology that is assumed to go along with it. But those who continue to find us, when they didn't even know that they were seeking, speaks to the longing that so many are feeling - a longing for a God whose embrace is so much wider than our own.

When I look at the names on the list I compiled, and think of the love each person on that list pours into our community and our world, as do those who came to us in an earlier time in a more traditional way, I naturally wonder what our church might look like had each one of us never "found" what we were looking for here in our 284-year-old congregation. Our world has changed in the last 40+ years, as it did in the 250 years prior, and our church has changed along with it. What hasn't changed is our call to be the loving, grace-filled, arms-wide-open presence of God for one another. May we continue to live into this call, and see it and show it for others, in the signs all around us.

# **Widening Our Welcome**

The WOW Team is an informal group from our congregation that meets regularly to brainstorm ways to make our church more welcoming to more people. The group kicked off in the fall of 2023 to talk about what it means to take our Opening & Affirming pledge to the next step. The team, which consists of Pastor Maureen Frescott, Pastor Charlotte Bell, Pastor Shellie Brook, Rev. Shayna Appel, Larissa Riley, Vicky Leknes, Bruce Kinney, and Steve Boczenowski, quickly decided that the next phase in our Open & Affirming mission should consist of broadening our welcome to all members of our society, with a current focus on members of the LGBTQIA+community, people of color, and people with physical challenges. With that in mind, the group decided to call themselves the Widening Our Welcome Team, or the WOW Team.

Some of the activities of the WOW Team thus far include making pronoun stickers available for name badges; participating in the Milford Pride event; and hosting a second hour presentation on Diversity, Equity, Inclusion; and YANA.

#### **Good Stuff Sale Donations**
