SCRIPTURE LESSON

Peter Denies Jesus

Matthew 26:57, 69-75

Those who had arrested Jesus took him to Caiaphas the high priest, in whose house the scribes and the elders had gathered. Now Peter was sitting outside in the courtyard. A servant-girl came to him and said, 'You also were with Jesus the Galilean.' But he denied it before all of them, saying, 'I do not know what you are talking about.' When he went out to the porch, another servant-girl saw him, and she said to the bystanders, 'This man was with Jesus of Nazareth.' Again he denied it with an oath, 'I do not know the man.' After a little while the bystanders came up and said to Peter, 'Certainly you are also one of them, for your accent betrays you.' Then he began to curse, and he swore an oath, 'I do not know the man!' At that moment the cock crowed. Then Peter remembered what Jesus had said: 'Before the cock crows, you will deny me three times.' And he went out and wept bitterly.

PRAYER OF CONFESSION

One: Holy One, our Creator and our Redeemer,

Many: When Jesus asks us to love our neighbors, to forgive our persecutors, to welcome strangers, to protect children, to turn over tables of injustice, we deny that we know him, and walk away.

One: In so many ways, on so many days,

Many: we are closer to Judas and Peter than we are to Jesus.

One: When we are stressed, we try to take control.

Many: When we are afraid, we try to fight or hide.

One: When it's time to trust you, we find good reasons to betray you.

Many: When it's time to follow you, we find good reasons to deny you.

Many: Forgive us, O God, and give us courage and hope. Remind us that just like you loved Judas and Peter, you love us, even with our failings. Strengthen us as we walk with you to the cross, through the night, and into the dawning resurrection that you promise us. In the light we are forgiven. Amen.

ORGAN RESPONSE

Jesus or Barabbas

Pilate then called together the chief priests, the leaders, and the people, and said to them, 'You brought me this man as one who was perverting the people; and here I have examined him in your presence and have not found this man guilty of any of your charges against him. Indeed, he has done nothing to deserve death. I will therefore have him flogged and release him.'

Then they all shouted out together, 'Away with this fellow! Release Barabbas for us!' (This was a man who had been put in prison for insurrection and for murder.) Pilate, wanting to release Jesus, addressed them again; but they kept shouting, 'Crucify, crucify him!' A third time he said to them, 'Why? What evil has he done? I have found in him no ground for the sentence of death." But they kept urgently demanding with loud shouts that he should be crucified; and their voices prevailed. So Pilate gave his verdict that their demand should be granted. He released Barabbas and he handed Jesus over as they wished.

SCRIPTURE

Jesus Crucified

Luke 23:33-35, 44-47

When they came to the place that is called The Skull, they crucified Jesus there with the criminals, one on his right and one on his left. Then Jesus said, 'Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing.' And they cast lots to divide his clothing. And the people stood by, watching; but the leaders scoffed at him, saying, 'He saved others; let him save himself if he is the Messiah of God, his chosen one!'

It was now about noon, and darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon, while the sun's light failed; and the curtain of the temple was torn in two. Then Jesus, crying with a loud voice, said, 'Father, into your hands I commend my spirit.' Having said this, he breathed his last. When the centurion saw what had taken place, he praised God and said, 'Certainly this man was innocent.'

DID YOU KNOW: Dorothy Lee Bolden founded the National Domestic Workers Union of America (NDWUA) in 1968, organizing workers who had long been excluded from labor protections. Ms. Bolden followed in her mother's footsteps and became a housekeeper at 9 years of age, which she continued for 49 more years. She understood the multiple roles domestic workers played stating that, "A domestic worker is a counselor, a doctor, a nurse. She cares about the family she works for as she cares about her own." With this experience and understanding, as well as innovative organizing strategies, Ms. Bolden developed a model for empowering and protecting marginalized workers. From 28 Days of Black History, shared by CCA Racial Justice Group.


